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News Release: New Tools Help Keep Care Providers Safe, Healthy, and Caring for Nova Scotians

Halifax, N.S. Leaders in the long-term care, home care and disability support sectors have more tools to help them keep care providers safe as they do the important work of caring for others. A new <u>Leader Safety Playbook</u> recently launched by <u>AWARE-NS</u> is a comprehensive resource developed for leaders, by leaders to equip them on their journey in safety leadership. Through the continued introduction of supports and resources based on evolving sector requirements, this sustainable and scalable tool is designed to meet leaders' needs now, and in the future.

More than 22,000 Nova Scotians work in these sectors, which have been steadily making progress when it comes to improving safety and keeping care providers healthy and at work, thanks to a partnership between industry and government.

The Leader Safety Playbook is part of a growing list of supports that are helping leaders build and maintain better workplace safety programs for their employees and support their safe and timely return to work.

"This is another powerful health and safety tool that will make a huge difference," says Dawn Pickering, the new Executive Director at AWARE-NS, the safety association that's working toward improving safety outcomes in the long-term care, home care, and disability support program sectors — along with the Departments of Community Services, Seniors and Long-Term Care, and Labour, Skills and Immigration, and WCB Nova Scotia. "We believe that safe and healthy workplaces are the foundation for care providers to do the critical work of supporting safe, healthy, and happy Nova Scotians."

This is also the theme of a new awareness campaign, *Better Safety, Better Care*, which launched in February through a collaboration between government, WCB Nova Scotia, and AWARE-NS. The campaign emphasizes the critical connection between the safety of workers in the home care and long-term care sectors and their ability to provide safe and healthy care to clients and residents. It features personal stories from care providers and receivers on the importance of building a *safety-for-all* culture in these sectors.
